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ANDERSEN ELEMENTARY KIDS TO LEARN ABOUT NUTRITION & FITNESS

Minneapolis –School children at Andersen Elementary School are about to learn they have the “Power to be Fit!” Allina Hospitals & Clinics, PreferredOne, and the Minnesota Medical Association (MMA), are joining together to sponsor an in-school curriculum on fitness and nutrition, built around the educational play, “The Power of the Pyramid,” which will be presented in 325 Minnesota schools by the end of the 2007 school year.

The 30-minute play will be performed at the Andersen Elementary in Minneapolis on February 8, 2006 at 9:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. and reporters are welcome to attend.

The play is presented by The National Theatre for Children, which has 26 years of experience producing highly successful educational programs. This is the first time health care providers and schools have collaborated on a program to teach children and their families how to stay healthy.

Geared to elementary school children and their parents, the program makes it easy and fun to learn about nutrition and fitness. In school, children will see a live interactive performance of "The Power of the Pyramid." Its lessons will be reinforced by workbooks, take-home activities to complete with their family, and classroom posters. There are also guidebooks and curriculum aids for teachers. In Allina clinics and other clinics selected by PreferredOne, children will receive an educational CD-ROM game and a family guide.

"Nutrition education is key to reducing obesity and this initiative will get our children headed toward healthy behavior and improved health in a fun, attention-getting positive manner," said John Frederick, M.D., executive vice president and chief medical officer for PreferredOne.
